## Newspaper hostages released

LUMBERTON, N.C. (AP) — Two armed American Indians who had taken over a newspaper office Monday to protest the death of a black jail inmate released their last seven hostages after a 10-hour standoff.

"It's over. The hostages have been released," Jim Sughrue, Gov. Jim Martin's press secretary, said shortly after 8 p.m.

The Indians, identified as Timo-

thy Jacobs and Eddie Hatcher, had demanded to speak with Martin before ending the siege at The Robesonian newspaper. Martin told a news conference that he did not negotiate with the two directly but agreed to meet with them later and to set up a task force to investigate their complaints.

"None of these are the kinds of demands that could not be met," Martin said.

Jacobs, 19, and Hatcher, 30, said they were Tuscarora-Cherokee Indians. Authorities said they were from nearby Pembroke.

Paul Daly, the agent-in-charge of the FBI in North Carolina, said Hatcher and Jacobs would be charged with hostage-taking and federal firearms violations. After they were taken into custody by FBI agents, they were taken to a jail outside the county.
